Brief Recap

So, what is a Public Charter School?

- Still a Public School
- Direct Involvement from Parents and Community
- There are some unique requirements that charter schools have to meet.

The Basics of Gwynne Valley Rural Academy

- *Planned* September 2024 Start Date
- Planned Grades K–9 in Year One
- First-year Grade 8 and 9 students will be able to graduate Grade 12 at GVRA
- GVRA intends to add one grade per year: Gr. 10 in 2025, Gr. 11 in 2026, and completing our Grades K–12 offering in 2027.

Timeline Update:

- 1) Conditional Approval for the GVRA Charter was granted by the education minister on April 26 of last year.
- 2) Previous efforts to open in September 2023 were simply a no-go with a provincial election and numerous bureaucratic hurdles.
- 3) At the invitation of Education Minister Demetrios Nicolaides, a delegation from our board met with the Minister, our MLA Rick Wilson and senior staff at the Alberta Legislature in September.
- 4) The team is working tirelessly behind the scene with Government of Alberta employees in 3 different departments Education, Capital, and Infrastructure to move this forward.

Introducing Dr. Karen Penney

As an educator and deputy superintendent in Alberta schools for nearly 40 years, Dr. Karen Penney has served Alberta students with distinction.

When our Board approached her last Spring about the possibility of serving in GVRA, Dr. Penney was excited to come out of recent retirement to help us establish our public charter school, and we are so pleased to have her on the GVREA team.

Dr. Penney made a brief presentation to group as outlined below.





Presentation – The 4 Pillars of EVE

Early Vocational Exposure is a Grades K–12 curriculum expansion that prioritizes the development of practical skills and vocational understanding throughout students' primary and secondary education.

We boil EVE down to one phrase: "Vocational preparation begins in Kindergarten." The following is a simple graph representing the connections of the four pillars of: 1) Parental & Community Involvement 2) Sustainable Living 3) Conventional Life Skills 4) Curriculum & Instruction Conventional Life Skills Parental & Early Vocational **Sustainable Living** Community Exposure Involvement **Curriculum &** Instruction

EVE Key Components

- Student interaction with variety of environments
 - Tangible experiences including
 - o Extensive hands-on
 - Visual-spatial learning tools
 - Kinesthetic development
- Emphasis on self sufficiency and resiliency
- Student ownership for practical skills
- Awareness of wide variety of vocations and post secondary options
- Community career engagement with parental involvement
- Where possible, onsite learning opportunities



Parental & Community Involvement

Parental involvement is a critical component of EVE. At GVRA, this can look like parents, community members and alumni:

- Serving as guest speakers
- Providing demonstrations and presentations in areas of expertise
- Acting as mentors and volunteers
- Supporting the school through various types of donations

Examples

- Canning & pickling vegetables
- Gardening basics

- Using farm equipment
- Small engine repair and car maintenance
- Managing kitchen appliances
- Small business operations

Sustainable Living

Both a pillar and a subset of Conventional Life Skills, Sustainable Living is critical to the survival of small communities.

- Food security has become an urgent concern worldwide. The skills our parents and grandparents used from birth to death to feed their families and communities have been lost in our rapid-paced, technology driven world.
- Food costs have doubled or tripled in recent years, which emphasizes the need for students to know how to grow their own food at a fraction of the cost of purchasing them.
- Not only will students be empowered to provide nutritious foods for their families, but they will be confident to teach these skills worldwide, wherever life should take them. Sustainable living is a practical, hands-on lifestyle, kind to our environment and future generations. Been lost in our rapid-paced, technology-driven world.

Community Input and Responses

In inviting parents and community members to the Info Meeting on January 31, the purpose of the event was threefold: 1) to provide an update on the status of the charter school application, 2) to provide an overview of the Early Vocational Exposure (EVE) model, and, 3) to solicit input from the community on skills and/or talents they could bring to Gwynne Valley Rural Academy.

Attendees split into groups of 6 to 8 for about 35 minutes to discuss three important questions posed by the GVREA Board.

GVREA Directors hosted the small groups and recorded responses. The team was very encouraged by the initial feedback to the questions asked of the community!

The diversity of skillset and experiences in the greater Gwynne area is a strong indication of how important parental and community involvement will be to GVRA's success.

After the small groups regathered, a quick summary of the Community Input was shared by the Directors with the whole group. Subsequently, the information was compiled.
